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# The County of Wellington 2025 Budget Highlights

At the January 30 County Council meeting, Wellington County Council adopted its 2025 budget with a 3.9% increase to the County portion of property taxes. The budget makes significant investments in infrastructure, waste facilities, the housing and homelessness system, ambulance, long-term care, child care services, and the Ride Well Rural Transportation Service. Highlights of the 2025 Budget include:


- \$44.3 million in roads capital infrastructure and public works facilities, including a new public works garage in Erin (2025/2026) and the reconstruction of four bridges in Arthur (Wellington Road 109) over the next two years.
- Facility upgrades at the Elora Transfer Station, providing similar infrastructure, working conditions and patron experience to the other County waste facilities.

- \$9.7 million in capital repairs and enhancements to social housing and affordable housing units.
- Investment in land acquisition for new Ambulance Station facilities within the County.
- Enhanced direct care hours at the Wellington Terrace Long-Term Care Home, supported by the Government of Ontario.
- Significant investment in Children's Early Years from the Federal government to improve childcare affordability.
- Long-term commitment towards
   RideWell Rural Transportation, the
   County's on-demand ride sharing
   service as supported by Provincial Gas
   Tax Funding.
- Adoption of a Diversion Centre model at County waste facilities to improve diversion efforts.
- Implementation of the Home Energy Efficiency (HEET) Programme to provide low-cost loans to support residential energy-efficiency improvements.

# Property Tax Rebate for Eligible Charities and Similar Organizations

A tax rebate programme is available for charities and similar organizations that own or lease

space in commercial or industrial properties. County Council has approved a rebate of 40% of taxes paid by an eligible charity on the eligible property it occupies. Applications, along with proof of taxes paid, should be directed to the municipality where the property is located.
