#### COMMUNITY HOMELESSNESS REPORT SUMMARY

#### **County of Wellington**

#### 2023-2024

The Community Homelessness Report (CHR) is an annual Reaching Home reporting deliverable that supports communities to prevent and reduce homelessness using a more coordinated, systems-based and data-driven response. The CHR was designed to support local discussions and decision making, using all of the information about homelessness currently available at the community level. Communities are encouraged to use their CHR data to develop clear plans of action that help them to reach their homelessness reduction targets and to leverage the collective efforts of service providers working across the community, regardless of how they are funded.

This is a summary of the CHR for the 2023-24 reporting cycle. It shows the community's self-assessment of Reaching Home implementation, which includes the following key components:

- meaningful collaboration between Indigenous and non-Indigenous partners (see Section 1);
- community-level governance, coordinated service delivery (Coordinated Access) and use of a Homelessness Management Information System or HMIS (see Section 2); and,
- an Outcomes-Based Approach (tracking community-level outcomes and progress against targets using person-specific data; see Section 3).

If the community was able to report on outcomes and targets, this CHR Summary also includes results for each of the five core outcomes of Reaching Home (see Section 4).

Describe this collaboration in more detail.

Community partners were engaged in the implementation of our Coordinated Entry System (CES) and HIFIS 4. Working groups meet monthly to discuss barriers and system improvements that are required. Southwest Ontario Aboriginal Health Access Centre (SOAHAC) is engaged with our Coordinated Entry System and participating in our working groups that meets monthly to improve how we respond to homelessness and provide culturally appropriate services and supports in our community. The County has partnered with SOAHAC last reporting period and created a pilot programme for an Indigenous Housing Outreach Worker to provide housing stability supports for Indigenous Peoples in our community. We have increased the support in our community by adding an additional Indigenous Housing Outreach Worker. Through this partnership we have been able to work more intentionally with SOAHAC to support individuals/families who identify as Indigenous on our By Name List. Through this partnership we have been able to further increase our provision of culturally appropriate services and supports in our community. One example would be that we currently receive 1 in 10 local priority offers from our social housing stock to support housing for an individual on the By Name List. We have identified Indigenous peoples as a priority group (among others) when we are housing the appropriate individual for the available unit. We have also worked together to ensure that all the permanent housing solutions we create will offer culturally appropriate services and prioritize Indigenous peoples. Even with the small steps that we have taken so far, we know that Indigenous peoples continue to be overrepresented on our By Name List and are committed to continuous improvement.

Our community has been working with a Coordinated Entry System (CES) since 2016 and continues to work on improving and engaging members towards our goal of ending chronic homelessness. Our community has met the minimum requirements set by Reaching Home. The County is also a Built for Zero (BFZ) Canada community and is committed to continuous improvement of the Guelph Wellington Coordinated Entry System. Our local BFZ governance structure is our Wellington-Guelph BFZ Operations Committee that provides strategic guidance and oversight to the local BFZ campaign by problem solving system barriers brought forward by the GW BFZ Working Group and GW Housing Stability Working Group and providing direction on the campaign, including advocacy, communications, and finding and maintaining housing. The GWBFZ is responsible for setting direction for addressing homelessness in the community. The GWBFZ is expected to implement priorities established by the current Community Plan that address homelessness in Wellington County (including the City of Guelph) with the resources available from the Federal Government's Reaching Home: Canada's Homelessness Strategy. Participating in BFZ, our community regularly reviews our data from CES and adopts methods for system improvement towards our goal of ending chronic homelessness.

#### **Summary Comment**

Highlight efforts and/or issues related to your community's work to implement, maintain or improve the Outcomes-Based Approach under Reaching Home.

The County will continue to work towards system improvements with our Coordinated Entry System (CES). Since completing our Point in Time (PiT) Count in October 2021, we have improved system engagement with CES and have also continued cross referencing our BNL with HIFIS. This has increased the inflow and outflow we see on our BNL and has improved accuracy. The County introduced a Basic BNL Screening Tool last reporting period that continues to be available and has been used more consistently during this reporting period.

Data from our CES was used to support the creation of 100 supportive housing units in our community that will open throughout 2023 and intake will be from our BNL. Most individuals on the BNL score high acuity on the VI-SPDAT and will require intensive supports to successfully obtain and maintain housing. The current housing crisis in our community has made it difficult to quickly rehouse individuals experiencing homelessness. Our vacancy rate remains very low while the market rents continue to increase.

The County will continue to find creative solutions to improve the CES and reducing homelessness in our community while also highlighting the need for investment from all levels of government to support this goal.

We have been working closely with our community partners to maintain and improve person-specific data over the past year. We meet with our community partners regularly to discuss any barriers or new ways to collect information about the individuals and families they support.


Describe the process(es) used by service providers to collect and enter data about people currently experiencing homelessness into the database.

Currently service providers complete the common assessment tool in HIFIS, paper copy or an alternate electronic copy. Once the common assessment tool is complete we add the information to our master spreadsheet which currently exists in Excel. We also add any paper or electronic copies to HIFIS to ensure the information is available. We also have our shelter service provider and case managers who work with individuals and will complete information in HIFIS including but not limited to client vitals, address history, housing placements, goods and services, group activities, turn aways, surveys and more to try and capture as much information as possible to avoid having an individual or family repeating their information.
